


REPRESENTATIVE VICKI DOUDERA

Dear Amy,

We're into the third month of the legislative session here in Augusta, and the 131st Legislature has begun working through the roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that have been submitted.

While the bills that we consider will address hundreds of different topics, the bulk of my focus is on solving our state's most urgent challenges, including addressing the housing crisis, creating a fair and robust economy, protecting our natural resources and making life easier for families to make ends meet.

In recent weeks, I've been busy in the Environment and Natural Resources Committee and the Marine Resources Committee as public hearings and work sessions have begun. I've also been working on several bills that I've submitted, including:

 <u>LD 67</u> – An Act to Increase the Number of Educational Professionals by Accepting Out-of-state Certification

- <u>LD 692</u> An Act Regarding Eligibility of County Jail Inmates for a Community Confinement Monitoring Program
- <u>LD 536</u> An Act to Provide Natural Organic Reduction Facilities for Maine Citizens

Most of my bills, including those three, were originally suggested by community members. To see a current bill list that is continually updated, please <u>click this</u> <u>link</u>.

One bill that has garnered much attention was requested by a constituent in Rockport who is concerned with protecting wild birds from free-roaming cats. Although <u>LD 644</u> did not advance, it started a very productive conversation around the issue and has already spurred positive action (and collaboration) between Maine Audubon and the Maine Humane Society. I've never had so many people from around the state and our communities reach out to share their perspective – pro and con. It was a true democratic process!

No doubt you'll see my Subaru, Clementine, buzzing back and forth to Augusta in the coming weeks. There is a lot of work ahead of us until we adjourn at the end of June, and I am looking forward to being an advocate for our community on these important issues.

INVESTING IN MAINE INFRASTRUCTURE

The Maine Department of Transportation recently released its Three-Year Work Plan!

The plan outlines all work intended by DOT for calendar years 2023, 2024 and 2025. It includes capital projects and programs, maintenance and operations activities and other planning initiatives. This plan contains nearly 2,600 work items with a total value of \$3.94 billion, including work on Camden's Rawson Avenue pedestrian and bike bridge and Rockport's Goose River bridge.

HELP KNOCK OUT BROWN TAIL MOTHS

With the first day of spring around the corner, it's not too late to start looking at your trees to find and prune brown tail moth nests.

While the poisonous hairs produced by the moth's caterpillars are toxic to people, the moths also damage trees by stripping away leaves.
